A BEAR NAMED TROUBLE

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A Bear Named Trouble by Marion Dane Bauer. Houghton Mifflin, 2005. 128 pages.

Summary

This story, based on a true event, is told in alternating chapters from the points of view of a bear and a boy. Jonathan, a ten-year-old boy, enjoys spending time with the animals at the Alaska Zoo in Anchorage where his father is the zookeeper. Jonathan is lonely because he and his father have recently moved to Anchorage and his mother and sister have not yet joined them. He spends all of his free time at the zoo and loves all of the animals, especially Mama Goose. Simultaneously, a young wild brown bear is also without his mother. He is also lonely—and hungry. In his search for food, he stumbles upon the zoo. Jonathan watches him and empathizes with his plight. But when the bear accidentally kills Mama Goose, Jonathan's sympathy turns to anger. He plans to make sure that the bear will meet his death just as his beloved goose did. As the story progresses, Jonathan's desire for revenge changes to a deeper understanding, and he decides to help his father save the bear. Trouble is finally captured, but instead of being killed, he is placed in the Lake Superior Zoo.

Author's Biography

Marion Dane Bauer was born on November 20, 1938 in Oglesby, Illinois. She received her Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Oklahoma in 1962 and became a teacher. Bauer began writing professionally when her daughter was three years old. Most of her books, which include picture books, early chapter books and novels, focus on young people who learn to cope with traumatic events in everyday life. She has won numerous awards, including two Newbery Honor awards for *On My Honor* and for *Runt*. She has written, edited or contributed to over 170 books in her career. She currently lives in Eden Prairie, Minnesota, and teaches Writing for Children and Young Adults in the Master of Fine Arts program at Vermont College. http://www.mariondanebauer.com/

This guide includes excellent discussion questions and classroom activities related to the book, to bears, and to zoo animals. It also includes a lesson about how to distinguish between fiction and nonfiction, plus a list of books about topics related to the book.

Bears

Have the students research different types of bears and present the information to the class. Topics of student research may include:

- Characteristics of the bear, such as the bear's average size, habitat, and diet.
- A diagram labeling the external and internal parts of bear.
- How bears hunt and fish.
- Why bears hibernate.
- Definition of the word "omnivore." A list of the animals that are the bear's prey.

- Have students use the Internet and informational books to obtain information about Alaska. Use this information to create a PowerPoint presentation.
- Using a map of the United States, locate the state of Alaska and the city of Anchorage.
