Summary

Mitty Blake is a junior at St. Raphael's, a Manhattan prep school in New York City. It is a school for the very smart or the very rich. Mitty's family is in the "very rich" category. He could care less about doing his schoolwork. Mitty would rather listen to his iPod and roam the streets. But he must do a paper on small pox for biology class. While staying the weekend at his parent's country home in Connecticut, Mitty discovers some very old medical texts and decides to use these for his research. While thumbing through the old text, he comes across an envelope containing scabs from the 1902 smallpox epidemic in Boston. After handling the scabs, it occurs to him that he could get smallpox from handling them, so he sends anonymous emails to various agencies to try to get some answers. The recipients get suspicious and forward the emails to the FBI. Before the FBI can find Mitty, a terrorist group that plans to use him as a biological weapon kidnaps him. Mitty is trapped and nobody knows where he is. Left alone, with nobody to rely on but himself, Mitty transforms from a laid-back slacker to an ingenious man of action. Although the plot stretches credibility, story is intriguing, suspenseful and enjoyable to read. Mitty is a likeable guy, and the reader is happy to see him take charge of his life.
