Summary

Nine-year-old, Sara Baker is terrified of dogs. Her family has tried to help her overcome her fear, but nothing seems to work. Sara is hoping that a nice family with children to play with will move in next door. She is disappointed when a single woman moves in. What is worse is that the new neighbor, Ms. Harrington has her two big dogs, Max, a yellow Lab, and Jake, a Dalmatian. Nevertheless, Ms. Harrington is so nice that she and Sara become good friends. When Ms. Harrington falls and breaks her leg, Sara is the only one around. She must go into the yard with the dogs to help her neighbor. Sara must finally face her fear of dogs. This early chapter book, illustrated with simple black sketches, will be enjoyed by young readers. Children who have a fear of dogs will especially appreciate Sara's dilemma.

Classroom Connections

- Invite a vet to the classroom to speak to the students.
- Give a synopsis of the story and have students write their story endings before they read the story. Ask a question, such as "Will Sarah help her neighbor?"
- Discuss the importance of helping others. Read aloud *Wilfred Gordon McDonald Partridge* by Mem Fox and discuss how Wilfred helped Miss Nancy Alison Delacourt Cooper. Then use a Venn Diagram to compare/contrast Ms. Harrington and Miss Cooper.
