April 1 is Census Day. As required by the Constitution, the census has been conducted every 10 years since 1790.

Census results play a large part in determining how government entities allocate hundreds of billions of

dollars each year for services that communities rely on. But certain groups of people historically have been undercounted in the census. We want to make sure that the people NLS and its network libraries serve—people who are blind or visually impaired, or who have a disability that makes reading regular print difficult—are aware of, and participate in, the 2020 census. 2020 Adult Summer Reading Program



The TBBL 2020 Adult Summer Reading Program will start May 1, 2020, and will run through August 31. The theme this year is "Imagine Your Story".

The prize this year is a DVD. If you complete the program by reading 20 books, you will be entered into a drawing to win one of 25 copies of the DVD entitled *A Dog's Purpose*, staring Dennis Quaid, Josh Gad, Britt Robertson, and KJ Apa. This movie is rated PG and tells the story, from the perspective of a devoted dog, of how he discovers the meaning of his own existence through the lives of the humans he teaches to laugh and love. This DVD has a special feature called DVS that can be turned on or off at will. DVS stands for Descriptive Video Service and makes the video accessible to blind and visually impaired individuals. During the natural pauses in the dialogue, a narrator describes the essential visual elements of the scene.

Adult Summer Reading 2020 Book Recommendations

Our Adult Summer Reading program will start on May 1 and end on August 31. The theme this year is "Imagine Your Story", and includes topics such as mythology, folklore, and fairy tales! Here are some book recommendations based on this year's theme:

DB87395 *Norse Mythology* by Neil Gaiman. Award-winning fantasy author provides his interpretation of classic Norse mythology and its pantheon. Provides a novelistic arc to the retelling that begins with the genesis of the nine worlds and culminates with the Ragnarok apocalypse.



DB86252 *The Invisible Library* by Genevieve Cogman. Irene works as an agent for the Invisible Library, tracking down rare manuscripts from alternate realities. She and her assistant travel to a version of Victorian London only to find that the book they seek has already been stolen.

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DB87828 *The Motorcycle Diaries* by Che Guevara. Guevara's diary of his 1952 trip through Latin America when he was a twenty-three-year-old Argentinian medical student. Among the musings of a privileged youth taking a year off for a road trip, he also reveals hints of the revolutionary he was to become.

DB92229 Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone by J.K. Rowling. On Harry Potter's eleventh birthday, he learns that he is more than an unwanted orphan. The Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry recruits him because he has inherent magical abilities. As he purchases his school supplies—robes, wand, and messenger owl—Harry looks forward to attending his new boarding school.

DB81926 *The Wrath and the Dawn* by Renee Ahdieh. In this reimagining of The Arabian Nights, Shahrzad plans to avenge the death of her dearest friend by volunteering to marry the murderous boy-king of Khorasan. But, she discovers not all is as it seems within the palace.

DB94540 *The Priory of the Orange Tree* by Samantha Shannon. Sabran, queen of Inys, must conceive a daughter, as her bloodline binds the dragons that would otherwise destroy the realm. Assassins hunt her, but her lady-inwaiting Ead Duryan keeps watch, armed with forbidden magic.

DB88295 *The Essex Serpent* by Sarah Perry. England, 1893. Newly widowed Cora Seaborne retreats from London to the Essex coast with her young son, Francis, and his maid, Martha. There, they encounter the mysterious presence of the Essex Serpent, which is supposedly preying on locals. Cora does not believe in myths and decides to investigate.

DB63195 *The Once and Future King* by T.H. White. Four novels retelling the Arthurian legend from Arthur's birth through the end of his reign: *The Sword in the Stone, The Queen of Air and Darkness, The III-Made Knight,* and *The Candle in the Wind.*

DB81519 *An Ember in the Ashes* by Sabaa Tahir. Laia is a scholar living under the iron-fisted rule of the Martial Empire. When her brother is arrested for treason, Laia goes undercover as a slave at the empire's greatest military academy to find a way to save him.

DB90711 *Circe* by Madeline Miller. Circe grows up in the court of her father, the sun god Helios. Despised by her parents and others, she falls in love with a mortal who shuns her. When she takes revenge, she is banished. Those who wish her and others harm, are transformed into pigs.

DB87310*The Bear and the Nightingale* by Katherine Arden. In fourteenthcentury Russia, young Vasilisa Petrovna can see and talk to the ancient spirits of the house and the forest. When her stepmother and a new village priest speak out against the old ways, angering the spirits, only Vasilisa can save her people.

From Crib to Crayons

The TBBL Early Literacy Program *From Crib to Crayons* will start its third year on June 1, 2020. Designed for children ages 0–6, six literacy packets will be sent throughout the year to children and their parents. Each bi-monthly kit will focus on one of six early literacy skills: print awareness, phonological awareness, print/play motivation, letter

knowledge, narrative skills, and vocabulary. Each packet will contain tips and strategies for developing pre-reading skills, including lists of resources and follow-up activities for parents. There will also be props, craft instructions, and a carefully selected child's book with tactile graphics or twin vision Braille targeting the specific early literacy skill for the child to keep. New Dates for BELL Academy

The National Federation of the Blind's Braille Enrichment Literacy and Learning (BELL) Academy helps blind and low-vision children develop the literacy and independent-living skills that will empower them to achieve their academic goals and live the lives they want. This year, through a partnership with Wells Fargo, BELL will encourage students to cultivate their knowledge of music, engage in physical activity, interact in their communities, and excel in their math abilities through Braille instruction.

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The NFB of Louisiana will host one residential/day NFB BELL Academy program at the Louisiana Center for the Blind in Ruston, from Sunday, May 31 through Saturday, June 6.
