Patrons who subscribe to *Talking Book Topics (TBT)* in large print will not receive the January–February 2022 or other 2022 issues in paper format due to ongoing supply-chain issues and worldwide paper shortages.

If you still want the print version of TBT, you can only get it online at the NLS website in HTML and PDF formats here: www.loc.gov/nls/tbt. The PDF contains the order form that you can print out and mail to us at the State Library - Talking Books and Braille Library.

If you would like to get the audio version of Talking Book Topics (TBT), there are two ways to get it:

- 1. TBT is available to download through BARD.
- 2. TBT is available through the free NFB-NEWSLINE service, which will read the publication to you over the phone. If you would like to sign up for this free service, then call your reader advisor at 1.800.543.4702.

Finally, if you would like to get the Braille version, *TBT* Abridged will be available through *Braille Book Review* in hardcopy braille and BRF on <u>www.loc.</u> <u>gov/nls/bbr</u>.

DB92214 *The Good Neighbor: The Life and Work of Fred Rogers* by Maxwell King. Biography of the creator and star of the television show *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood*. Traces the personal, professional, and artistic life of Rogers.

DB72601 *The Way of Kings: Stormlight Archive* by Brandon Sanderson. On storm-swept Roshar, cities are built in locations that are sheltered from the tempests and wars are fought over shardblades and shardplates—mystical armor that transforms men into warriors.

DB95374 *The Pioneers* by David G. McCullough. The Pulitzer Prize-winning author of John Adams (DB52275) recounts the settling of the Northwest Territory, which was ceded to the United States by Britain in the Treaty of Paris.

DB88665 *The Seven Husbands of Evelyn Hugo* by Taylor Jenkins Reid. Reclusive film legend decides to tell her life story to lowly magazine feature writer Monique Grant, to the consternation of many. As Evelyn recounts her life as a sexy starlet in Hollywood, Monique begins to understand herself better.

John J. Ratey. Psychiatrist explains how elevating heart rate and breaking a sweat beats stress, lifts mood, fights memory loss, and sharpens intellect by physically remodeling the brain for peak performance.

DB87031 Stories of Your Life and Others by Ted Chiang. Collection of eight science fiction short stories from awardwinning author, including Story of Your Life—the basis for the 2016 movie Arrival.

DB70410 *The Sweetness at the Bottom of the Pie* by C. Alan Bradley. England, 1950. Eleven-year-old aspiring chemist Flavia de Luce overhears her father in a heated argument with a stranger, who turns up dead. When Flavia's father is charged with murder, she seeks clues in their village and his past to exonerate him.

DB89038 *Braving the Wilderness* by Brene Brown. The author believes society is facing a spiritual crisis of disconnection and gives advice for belonging to something outside oneself.

DB73772 *Ready Player One* by Ernest Cline. 2045. Multi-billionaire James Halliday dies, leaving his last will and testament online for the world to see. His massively multiplayer online game OASIS has a hidden feature—an Easter egg—and the person who finds the egg first wins Halliday's fortune.
