BARD Express is a Windows-based application that simplifies the process of searching for, downloading, and transferring audio materials to a cartridge or USB flash drive (no more having to unzip files). BARD Express is

designed for use on personal computers running Windows XP, Vista, 7, 8, 8.1, and 10. It does not run on Macintosh computers.

Five new network-produced digital audio books

DBC11883 Rave On: The Biography of Buddy Holly by Norman Philip.

Songs like That'll Be the Day and Peggy Sue made Texan Buddy Holly a rock-and-roll star; his death at 22 in a 1959 plane crash made him a legend. His most enduring legacy was the effect that his 1958 tour had on a generation of British musicians who would soon incorporate what they heard into a musical phenomenon that would change the entertainment business. British writer Philip Norman, author of biographies of the Beatles and the Rolling Stones, had access to previously unavailable sources, including contracts and other documents owned by Norman Petty, the studio owner and record producer who brought Holly to prominence. This carefully researched biography offers new insights into Holly's brief life and his place in popular culture. Explicit descriptions of sex and strong language.

DBC03087 The Normal Christian Life by Watchman Nee.

An early leader in what became China's

phenomenal house church movement, Watchman Nee (1903-1972) spent the last 20 years of his life in a communist prison. First published in Bombay in 1957, his powerful meditation brings the daily reality of following Christ into sharp focus. This edition includes biographical information about the author, as well as about previous editions of this book.

DBC05669 *Thoughts in Solitude* by Thomas Merton.

Thoughtful, eloquent, and as timely now as when it was originally published in 1956, this book of meditations addresses the pleasure of a solitary life, as well as the necessity for quiet reflection in an age when so little is private. These reflections were written in 1953-54 at the Abbey of Gethsemane, near Bardstown KY. The book is divided into two parts: Aspects of the Spiritual Life, and The Love of Solitude.

DBC05780 *Blood Bond* by William W. Johnstone.

Matt Bodine and his half-Cheyenne blood brother Sam Two Wolves know that war is coming to the northern territories. While they determine whether their allegiance lies with the Indians or the U.S. Army in the summer of 1876, Custer's men and the tribes converge by the Little Bighorn River. Some strong language and some violence.

DBC00564 *Iron Kissed* by Patricia Briggs

Shapeshifting mechanic Mercy Thompson finds her loyalty sorely tested when her former boss and mentor is arrested for murder and left to rot behind bars by his own kind, while she is trying to choose between Sam and Adam, the two werewolves she loves. Some violence, some strong language and some descriptions of sex.

Attorney and brother of conservative commentator Rush Limbaugh analyzes the reliability and truthfulness of the Christian Bible. Addresses concerns and challenges raised by skeptics. Discusses archaeological support for the text and asserts that Christianity is compatible with the scientific method. Bestseller. 2014.

DB083265 I'll Never Write My Memoirs by Grace Jones.

How to Get Weather Alerts

The AccuWeather information service is offered on NFB-NEWSLINE, giving blind and print-disabled people instant access to emergency weather alerts.

NFB-NEWSLINE offers both seven-day weather forecasts as well as emergency weather alerts. These weather alerts are localized to your zip code, or using your GPS for the NFB-NEWSLINE iOS Mobile App. Now if you hear the emergency tones on your television and are unable to read the message scrolling on the screen, you can log into NFB-NEWSLINE and the weather emergency will be provided to you immediately.

NFB-NEWSLINE is a free audible newspaper and magazine reading service that provides information to blind and print-disabled readers over the telephone, online and on the iPhone.
