### **NLS Name Changes October 1**

NLS is pleased to announce that it has received final approval from the Librarian of Congress to change its name. This move will help address the use of outdated language in the current name and more clearly communicate the breadth of those it serves.

Beginning on October 1, the name will change officially to "National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled," though it will continue to be referred to by the abbreviation "NLS."

Both NLS and Library of Congress sought input on this change from stakeholder groups and gathered data through various public channels. In keeping with the strategic plan of the LOC, the new name is patron-centric. # Affiliated Blind of Louisiana 2019 State Convention

This year Affiliated Blind of Louisiana, an organization for blind, visually

impaired, and deaf-blind citizens of our state, is celebrating 36 years of support services to this underserved population. ABL was formed by blind and visually impaired individuals who believed achieving your dreams should not be hindered by a disability. It provides rehabilitation services through the ABL Training Center and hosts support groups throughout the state of Louisiana.

The convention will be held on September 20 through September 22, 2019 at the Holiday Inn Hotel at 1800 Martin Luther King Blvd. in Houma, Louisiana. The exhibit area will be open on Friday, September 21, from 2:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Participation as a vendor will be a great benefit to ABL members. Vendors begin set up at 12:00 p.m. in the exhibit area. One table and two chairs will be provided for each vendor. There will also be standard 110 outlets available. Bring your own extension cords and power sources if needed. There is a minimal charge of \$35.00 for each vendor to provide hotel set up. Set up fees are due by August 21, 2019.

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A representative from the Talking Books and Braille Library will be there.

# Finding Commercial and BARD-only Books

For the first eight decades of its existence, NLS almost always used its own recording studio staff or outside studios to record books. That changed in 2013, when NLS began partnerships with commercial publishers to obtain their audio files, free of charge.

"By taking advantage of commercial recordings when we can, we're getting more books into the talking-book program and doing it in a more timely fashion," NLS Director Karen Keninger said. "This helps us focus our efforts on producing books that don't have commercial audio counterparts."

It's a money-saver, too. There are still costs for converting a commercial file into a format that can be read by NLS talking-book machines and downloaded from BARD, but the narration costs for such titles are eliminated.

The titles that NLS produces are generally available on digital talking-book cartridges as well as on BARD. Those titles are also listed in *Talking Book Topics*.

The collection also includes many "BARD-exclusive" titles—most of which are commercial audiobooks—and aren't listed in *TBT*.

To easily find commercial audiobook titles in the collection, patrons can use the select "Voyager Search" at <a href="https://www.loc.gov/nls/braille-audio-reading-materials/online-catalog-search/">https://www.loc.gov/nls/braille-audio-reading-materials/online-catalog-search/</a>. Once you're on Voyager's "Basic Search" screen, type "commercial audio-book" (with the quote marks) under step one; leave the default option of "None" under step two; and select the first option, "Keyword (match ALL words)," under step three. That will give you more than 8,500 commercial titles currently in the collection.

# Free Accessible Touch Typing Tutor Available Online

Patrons wishing to learn to touch type or improve their skills may find Rocky's Audio Typing TutorV2 of interest. The program, which is free to download online, features finger exercises, word exercises, and whole sentence exercises and offers the ability to adjust audio speeds, audio voice, audio volumes, color contrast, and font size. It supports screen readers and is designed for blind and visually impaired computer users. # **Books About Our Solar System, Space, and Space Exploration**

Here are some books that match this year's theme for the Adult Summer Reading Program.

#### NONFICTION

**DB92406** The Penguin Book of Outer Space Exploration by John Logsdon. Space historian presents the story of America's journey to space. Chronicles the creation of NASA, and the future of space exploration in the twenty-first century.

DB85352 No Dream Is Too High: Life Lessons From a Man Who Walked on the Moon by Buzz Aldrin. Author shares thirteen lessons he learned over the course of his life. He discusses his support of future manned space exploration programs, particularly to Mars.

**DB81687** Beyond: Our Future in Space by Chris Impey. Author

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speculates on possible future modes of transportation through outer space. Examines the likelihood of various transportation options.

DB77759 An Astronaut's Guide to Life on Earth by Chris Hadfield. Former commander of the International Space Station discusses the ways his training and experiences in engineering, and space exploration prepared him to deal with worst-case scenarios. Provides details about day-to-day life in space, the physical effects on the body, and the return to Earth.

DB85625 Copernicus: A Very Short Introduction by Owen Gingerich. Leading authority discusses the ways Copernicus built on Ptolemy's ideas, and the author's search for original copies of Copernicus's De revolutionibus.

**DB87061** A space traveler's guide to the Solar System by Mark Thompson. Astronomer presents an exploration of the solar system as if it were possible to fly between planets as you would between cities on Earth.

DB85038 Merlin's Tour of the Universe: A Skywatcher's Guide to Everything From Mars and Quasars to Comets, Planets, Blue Moons, and Werewolves by Neil deGrasse Tyson. Astrophysicist uses the construct of Merlin--an ancient visitor from the planet Omniscia in the Andromeda galaxy--to answer questions about human understanding of the universe.

**DB89846** Astrophysics for people in a hurry by Neil deGrasse Tyson. Author explains astrophysics concepts in a condensed and easily digestible manner intended for people with limited time to

read about the subject. Topics covered include the big bang, light, the space between galaxies, dark matter, the solar system, and more. Bestseller.

#### **FICTION**

**DB78389** The Martian by Andy Weir. Six days after becoming the first man to walk on Mars, astronaut Mark Watney is caught in a windstorm. Though his support crew thinks he died, Mark survived and now faces abandonment, failed machinery, and a hostile environment. Strong language. Bestseller.


**DB90647** The last Jedi by Jason Fry. Rey's epic journey with Finn, Poe, and Luke Skywalker continues. Novelization of the movie Star Wars: The Last Jedi. Bestseller.

**DB82021** Aurora by Kim Stanley Robinson. Humanity embarked on its first voyage outside the solar system generations ago. Now it approaches its new home. Commercial audiobook.

**DB88595** The complete short fiction of Greg Bear. Topics include interstellar war, human evolution, intelligent bacteria, international terrorism, exploration of deep space, and more. Includes Just over the Horizon, Far Thoughts and Pale Gods, and Beyond the Farthest Suns.
