# **2020 Adult Summer Reading Program**

It's not too late to sign up for the Adult Summer Reading Program. It started on May 1, 2020, and will run through August 31. The theme this year is "Imagine Your Story". The prize this year is a DVD. If you complete the program by reading 20 books, you will be entered into a drawing to win one of 25 copies of the DVD entitled A Dog's Purpose, staring Dennis Quaid, Josh Gad, Britt Robertson, and KJ Apa. This movie is rated PG and tells the story, from the perspective of a devoted dog, of how he discovers the meaning of his own existence through the lives of the humans he teaches to laugh and love.

This DVD has a special feature called DVS that can be turned on or off at will. DVS stands for Descriptive Video Service and makes the video accessible to blind and visually impaired individuals. During the natural pauses in the dialogue, a narrator describes the essential visual elements of the scene.

If you would like, we will mail you an optional reading log to keep track of the books you have read. Once you have read 20 books, call your reader adviser to let them know, and your name will be entered into the drawing for the DVD. Audio books, Braille, large print books and magazines all count. If you need any reading suggestions, please ask us; we are happy to help! One entry per person. We will choose 25 lucky winners from the list of those who have read at least 20 books. Happy reading!

DB94175 Daisy Jones & the Six by Taylor Jenkins Reid. Daisy Jones, the daughter of a painter and a model, comes of age on L. A.'s Sunset Strip in the 1960s. As she falls into the rock 'n'

roll scene, she joins forces with an upand-coming band, The Six. The pairing becomes legendary.

by Lisa Wingate. The five Foss children are left alone at home in 1930s Mississippi and subsequently kidnapped by notorious child dealer Georgia Tann. In the present day, Avery Stafford meets elderly May--who used to be Rill Foss and is the sister of Avery's Grandma Judy. Avery investigates her family's history.

DB93842 The Last Equation of Isaac Severy by Nova Jacobs. After mathematician Isaac Severy dies of an apparent suicide, his adopted grand-daughter Hazel receives a letter from him. Isaac alludes to a secretive organization that is after his final bombshell equation, and he charges Hazel with safely delivering it to a trusted colleague.

**DB78150** The Rosie Project by Graeme Simsion. Socially stunted geneticist Don Tillman embarks on an endeavor he calls the Wife Project. As he quantifies the qualities of a perfect wife, he encounters Rosie, who seeks Don's help in identifying her real father.

NLS has recently updated BARD Mobile for iOS to incorporate many exciting new features. BARD Mobile for iOS additions include:

- · Simultaneous downloading
- Braille autoscroll with user-adjustable speed
- Quick switching between titles

- AirPlay support
- Clearer indication of whether a book is braille or audio when viewed in a list
- Magazine and series subscription management

One of the most exciting features is how much easier it is to find books similar to your current book. From any list of books, you can easily select a book and find other books by the same author, in the same series, and on the same subject. Here's how:

- Open a list of books such as a bookshelf category, your wish list, or Recently Added to BARD.
- 2. Find a book that interests you.
- 3. If you use VoiceOver, touch the book title and flick up or down. You will move through a set of options called an action menu. The menu wraps, so you will eventually reach all the options whether you flick up or down. Most of the options are the same regardless of the book list you are in, but some vary from one list to another. For instance, if a book is not on your device, there's a Download option. If it is not in your wish list, there's an Add to Wish List option. And if it is on your device, there's a Delete option.
- 4. All action menus include these options:
  - All books by [author's name]. If there is more than one author, each author has a separate entry.
  - All books in [subject]. If there is more than one subject, each subject has a separate entry.

- All books in [series] if the book is in a series.
- 5. Double-tap when you get to the option you want. A screen opens that lists the books in that category.

Note that every book on this new screen has the same options as in other lists. This makes it easy to download multiple books by the same author or in the same series or add them to your wish list.

If you don't use VoiceOver, or you do not want to use the action menu, you can reach the same options as follows:

- Choose the More Info button to the right of the book of interest.
- Choose the More Actions button to the right of the author's name, just below the title. A screen opens that lists all the options discussed above, as well as a Cancel button at the bottom.
- 3. Choose the option you want.

If your book is in a series, the final option before Cancel is a Subscribe button that allows you to subscribe to the series. If you do, any new books in the series are automatically added to your wish list when they are posted to BARD.

As you can see, it is now easy to find and download multiple related books. Please remember, though, that these books are not going anywhere, and you do not need to download them all at once. You can add them to your wish list and download them when you are ready to read them.
