Use the TBBL online catalog to order books

The TBBL online catalog lists all of the books in our collection. It is a convenient way to order books and is available 24/7. Many of our patrons use the TBBL catalog to do searches and place orders for books. Others have a family member or friend who does it for them. Hadley Institute course on using the internet and daily living tasks

Patrons looking to brush up on basic Internet skills may be interested in *Internet Essentials*, an online course from the Hadley Institute for the Blind and Visually Impaired. It includes four lessons and is open to both adult continuing education and high school students. Topics covered include accessible technology, desktop computers and mobile devices, searching for information, and making online purchases. Hadley also offers a series of audio recordings that share practical tips to address daily living tasks made difficult by vision loss. Designed specifically for older adults with visual impairments, these recordings are free of charge and available on CD or on a Digital Talking Book (DTB) cartridge that is compatible with your NLS digital talking-book machine. Breath switch for digital book player now available

NLS now offers a breath switch adaptor for those users that are unable to use the buttons on the digital talking book machine. The switch attaches to the machine through the USB port next to the headphone jack. This breath switch permits patrons to use Sip-and-Puff actions to control the Digital Talking Book Machine (DTBM). Using their breath, patrons may operate all buttons and

functions with the exception of the Power on/off feature. This unit is intended for patrons who are unable to use the buttons on the DTBM. A separate application form with certification is required to obtain the switch. Remote control for your DTBM

NLS is introducing a new accessory: the digital talking book machine (DTBM) remote control unit.

It consists of two parts:

The handheld remote control is approximately 5 inches long and $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide with rounded ends. The top has a lens with a smooth texture that is different from the rest of the remote control, and the bottom has a pin for attachment to a lanyard (not included). The top should be aimed at the DTBM when attempting to control it. The surface of the remote control has 15 buttons that are identical in shape and function to the buttons of the DTBM advanced model. The only DTBM button not available on the remote control is Power On/Off.

The IR (Infrared) receiver is a small USB device, approximately 2 inches square and 1 inch thick. The USB connector is near the bottom of the device.

Operation of the remote control

To use the remote control, plug the IR receiver into the USB port on the right side of the DTBM. Press the Power On/ Off button on the DTBM. Aim the remote control toward the IR receiver and press the buttons to control the DTBM. The IR receiver requires additional power from the player to operate, so it is best to connect the player to AC power when using the remote control.

Operation with model DS1

Model DS1 (standard) players must receive a software update via digital cartridge to recognize the remote control.

TBBL will only receive a limited number of these accessories from NLS, so if you have a need for this device, please contact us at 800.543.4702. We will keep a waiting list once we run out of the remote controls.

It is easy to navigate, even for those with limited knowledge of accessible technology software. Sprint releases IP Relay app for deaf and deaf-blind individuals

Individuals who are deaf, deaf-blind, hard of hearing, or have a speech disability may benefit from a new app launched by Sprint Accessibility. The Sprint IP Relay mobile app, available for both Android and iOS devices. allows callers to make or receive IP relay phone calls from virtually anywhere within the U.S. and its territories where there is a mobile or wi-fi connection. Features include braille display integration and the ability to change font size and color for increased legibility. Audio description available on Amazon videos

In June 2017 Amazon Video began supporting audio description, providing customers who are blind or visually impaired access to professional narration describing what is taking place during stretches where there is no dialog. More than 133 movies from studios such as Disney, Lionsgate,

NBC, Paramount, and Warner Brothers are now available with English audio descriptions, including such titles as *The Hunger Games, Inception, Captain America: Civil War*, and *The Big Short*. Also, ten of the most popular Amazon Original TV shows such as *Bosch*, *The Man in the High Castle, Mozart in the Jungle, Transparent, Creative Galaxy*, and *Gortimer Gibbons* are also now available with audio description for select seasons. Audio descriptions are available on popular titles included with an Amazon Prime Video subscription, as well as those for purchase or rent. The feature is available on Fire TV, Fire Tablets, iOS devices, and Android devices. Customers can view and browse through titles with audio descriptions by going to <u>www.amazon.</u> <u>com/video/audiodescription</u>. The selection of titles available on the page will be updated continuously. To play a title with audio descriptions, customers just need to select the "English-audio description" option from the "Subtitles and Audio" menu during playback. Announcing Talking Books and Braille Library's Annual Poetry Contest!

This winter, the Talking Books and Braille Library is sponsoring a poetry contest for middle school students ages 10-13 and teens ages 14-19. The theme will be *Music* and *Music Appreciation*. Each submission should be 200 words or less. Poems will be judged on originality, creativity, form and style, clarity, relevance to the theme, and overall impact. Winners will have their selections printed in the summer *Hotlines* newsletter and receive a certificate of distinction. Submissions will be accepted from patrons ages 10-13, and ages 14-19 until February 28, 2018. One winner will be selected from each age group. Poems will be judged by staff from the Louisiana Center for the Book.

Poetry contest submission guidelines

- Must be written by a Louisiana Talking Books and Braille Library patron between the ages of 10-19.
- 2. Poems must be original work by participant.

- 3. Patron may submit more than one poem, but is only eligible to win once.
- Poems may not contain any of the following: Graphic violence Explicit sexual content Strong Language

- Emailed submissions and release forms must have a subject line: 2018 TBBL Poetry Contest, the title and author of the poem.
