TBBL patron Julia Hawkins sets world record

One of our very own TBBL patrons made the news this past November, and not just in America, her story was carried in England, France, New Zealand, Peru, and all over the world.

Southern Living reports: "They don't call Julia Hawkins the 'Hurricane' for nothing. The 105-year-old from Baton Rouge is the oldest competitive female sprinter in the world. At the Louisiana Senior Games at Southeastern Louisiana University earlier this month, Hawkins ran the 100-meter dash in

1:02.95, setting a brand-new world record in the process. And she did it with a flower in her hair."

Mrs. Hawkins is a retired educator and a native Louisianan. She grew up in Ponchatoula and now lives in Baton Rouge.

IRS accessible tax documents

The Internal Revenue Service offers content in a variety of file formats to accommodate people who use assistive technology such as screen reading software, refreshable Braille displays, and voice recognition software. We have prepared hundreds of tax forms and publications that can be downloaded or viewed online in text-only, Braille ready files, browser-friendly HTML, accessible PDF, and large print.

Our PDF tax forms comply with Section 508 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2.1; however, the IRS does not advise filling out forms on mobile devices.

How to access multiple books on a cartridge

When you receive a cartridge with multiple books on it, you can access the books in one of two ways: The Easy Way or the Bookshelf Mode.

The Easy Way

- 1. When you reach the end of the book or initial instructions, press the green, rectangular Play button.
- 2. The machine will then prompt you to, "Press the Play button again to go to the next book." Go ahead and press the play button again, and the machine will start playing the next book.

Bookshelf Mode

- 1. Insert the cartridge in the player and turn the power on by pressing the red circular Power Button.
- 2. Press and hold the green, rectangular Play button for about 3 seconds until the player beeps and says "Bookshelf" and announces the number of books on the cartridge.
- 3. Tap the Rewind or Fast Forward button, located on each side of the green, rectangular button, to select the next book. The book title will be announced. To advance to the next title, just press the Fast Forward button again, or tap the Rewind button again to go to the previous book.
- 4. Once you get to the title you want to read, press the green, rectangular Play button. The player will exit Bookshelf Mode and start playing the selected title.

When her stepmother and a new village priest speak out against the old ways, angering the spirits, only Vasilisa can save her people.

New publication: Foreign Language Quarterly

Patrons seeking foreign language materials may now find them more easily. The recently launched Foreign Language Quarterly (FLQ), available at www.loc.gov/nls/flq, lists popular foreign language books recently added to the NLS collection and available through our network of cooperating libraries. Many of these books come to us from other countries via the Marrakesh Treaty. but patrons will also find books produced by NLS and converted from cassette tapes. All books listed in FLQ are available for immediate download from BARD. The new publication also provides directions on how to use new BARD features that allow users to search for materials in a specific language.
