TBT to ship with order form

NLS will resume circulating the Talking Book Topics (TBT) magazine cartridge and the order form in the same package. This will begin with the September— October 2016 issue.

Longtime subscribers may remember that the order form used to come in the same package as the cassette magazine. This changed in August 2012 with the launch of the Magazines on Cartridge (MOC) program and cartridges and order forms were mailed separately. However, this change was not well-received by *TBT* subscribers.

The *TBT* magazine cartridges and order forms will need to be returned separately. The cartridge goes back to the producer in its red container and the order form should be sealed and mailed to TBBL.

TBBL reader lands in a book!

One of our Louisiana TBBL readers is the inspiration for a character found in a recent book entitled *Postmark Bayou Chene* by Gwen Roland. We have been in contact with author Gwen Roland, and she says that the character named Loyce Snellgrove was inspired by one of her relatives. Here is what Gwen Roland told us:

The sassy, opinionated Loyce Snellgrove was inspired by my blind aunt who was born after my family moved from Bayou Chene in the 1920s. As a young woman, she babysat for her many nieces and nephews. Being one of the kids who tried to outwit her, I grew up in awe of her keen senses, astounding memory and intellect that foiled us at every turn. I've often wondered what her life would have been like if she had been born before the family moved from that watery wilderness, so I explored it in this book.

DB 84304 Postmark Bayou Chene by Gwen Roland, Atchafalaya Basin, Louisiana, 1907. A letter addressed to Hautes-Pyrénées, France, marked undeliverable, arrives at the Bayou Chene post office. That same day locals find a dog, nearly dead, tethered to an empty skiff. The lives of the postmaster's blind daughter and her two friends will soon change dramatically.

DBC 8157 Pathway to Independence a Guide for People with Vision Loss by Rita Thomas Kirsch

A book that offers both advice and techniques to assist the blind and visually impaired in approaching day to day tasks. Also has a section for sighted people who work with friends or acquaintances who are blind.

DBC 0802 A Vote of Confidence by Robin Lee Hatcher

Who says a woman can't do a man's job? Put up or shut up! Complaining about Bethlehem Springs' dissolute mayoral candidate, Gwen Arlington is challenged to take on the role herself. For seven years, she's carved out an independent life in the bustling mountain town of Bethlehem Springs, Idaho teaching piano and writing for the

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local newspaper. But now she's a single woman running for mayor—and in 1915 this decision is bound to stir up trouble.

The Blind and Visually Impaired Voter's Guide

The National Federation of the Blind Jernigan Institute has prepared a guide entitled *The Blind and Visually Impaired Voter's Guide.* Here are some excerpts from that guide:

The Help America Vote Act

The Help America Vote Act (HAVA) was signed into law on October 29, 2002, to address the problems that occurred during the 2000 presidential election. One of the goals of HAVA is to provide all American voters, including those who are blind or visually impaired, with the opportunity to vote both privately and independently. Therefore, HAVA requires that by January 1, 2006, all voting jurisdictions must provide at least one accessible voting machine per polling place and that any voting machines purchased with federal funds provided under HAVA on or after January 1, 2007, must be accessible.

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Why Blind Americans Should Vote

The right of blind Americans to vote is guaranteed by the United States Constitution. It is a right that many American citizens have demonstrated for, fought for, and died for so that present and future generations can continue to exercise their right to vote. Therefore, every blind or visually impaired citizen who is of voting age has a responsibility to exercise the right to vote.

Voting in any election, local or national, provides blind and visually impaired citizens with the opportunity to voice their opinion about elected leaders and policies and to help shape the future by electing candidates who share their views.
