25th anniversary of the ADA

It has been 25 years since President George H.W. Bush signed the Americans with Disabilities Act on July 26, 1990.

The ADA National Network says that "the ADA was the world's first comprehensive declaration of equality for people with disabilities. It was a collaborative effort of Democrats, Republicans, the legislative and the executive branches, federal and state agencies and people with and without disabilities.

"The ADA Anniversary is a time that we can reflect positively on a law that has made a great impact on the lives of people with disabilities and our country over the past 25 years. The message within the Preamble and history is powerful because it clearly states the Congressional intent that the law is intended 'to assure equality of opportunity, full participation, independent living and economic self-sufficiency for individuals with disabilities.' "

The 2010 Survey of Income and Program Participation estimates that there are 56.7

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million people with disabilities in America which is almost 19 percent of the population.

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Keep magazines longer

NLS increased the loan period on magazines circulated on cartridge to allow subscribers more time to enjoy publications. Subscribers' allotted reading time for weekly cartridges (those containing weekly magazines only) has increased from one week to three weeks and reading time for monthly cartridges (those containing monthly and weekly magazines) has increased from four weeks to seven weeks.

Free narrated TV programming on your TV and on the web

How do I turn description on for my TV?

All televisions 19 inches or larger that were manufactured in the last several years are equipped with a Second Audio Program or SAP option. Some newer televisions have a SAP or MTS button on the remote, but most are still menu driven on the TV screen. If this function is turned on, and if the program is described, you will be able to hear the description. Not all programming is described and for those programs that aren't, you may not be able to hear any audio at all when you turn on the SAP, so it is important to be able to switch back and forth from SAP-on to SAP-off.

Currently not all cable companies have the equipment required to pass the description through, but if you subscribe to a satellite service you should be able to receive it.

If you are not receiving the description via the SAP option for a program that is listed in the guide as described, you may need to contact your satellite or cable provider to request they pass through the SAP signal.
