BARD Express

NLS has released BARD Express. BARD Express is a Windows-based application that simplifies the process of searching for, downloading, and transferring audio materials to a cartridge or USB flash drive (no more having to "unzip" files). BARD Express is designed for use on personal computers running Windows XP, Vista, 7, 8, 8.1, and 10. It does not run on Macintosh computers.

E-Mail address changes and BARD

If you change e-mail address reason, you do not need to create a new BARD account. Instead, log into your BARD account and choose the Update Account Settings on the BARD Main Page. This will take you to a page of options, including a link to Change Your E-Mail Address. Once you change your e-mail address/user ID, you will receive an email with a temporary password. Login with the new email address and temporary password and create a new password to protect the security of your account.

WRBH Reading Radio - 88.3 FM

The mission of WRBH Reading Radio is "to turn the printed word into the spoken word so that the blind and print handicapped can receive the same ease of access to current information as their sighted peers."

WRBH offers a wide variety of programming including local and national news, best-selling fiction and non-fiction books, magazine articles, children's books, event calendars, interview segments, health programs, cooking shows, and grocery store ads, as well as shows geared toward Spanish, Haitian, and Vietnamese communities. This programming is available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

WRBH's FM signal is available across the following Louisiana parishes: Orleans, Jefferson, St. Tammany, St. Charles, St. John, Terrebonne, St. Bernard, and Plaquemines. WRBH is the United States' only 24-hour reading radio is one of only three such stations in the world.

WRBH is available on the internet via live audio streaming and podcasts. This means that anyone in the world can listen to WRBH's internet content.

Our new book will be a selection from classic literature: *Middlemarch* by George Eliot.

DB20078 Middlemarch by George Eliot. Reading time: 33 hours, 51 minutes. Read by Patricia Beaudry. Penguin Classics describes Middlemarch as "One of the most accomplished and prominent novels of the Victorian era, Middlemarch is an unsurpassed portrait of nineteenth-century English provincial life. Dorothea Brooke is a young woman of fervent ideals who yearns to effect social change yet faces resistance from the society she inhabits. In this epic in a

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small landscape, Eliot's large cast of precisely delineated characters and the rich tapestry of their stories result in a wise, compassionate, and astute vision of human nature. As Virginia Woolf declared, George Eliot 'was one of the first English novelists to discover that men and women think as well as feel, and the discovery was of great artistic moment.' "

George Eliot is the pen name for Mary Ann Evans Cross, who was born on November 22, 1819 at Arbury Farm, Warwickshire, England. She is also the author of *Adam Bede*, *The Mill on the Floss*, and *Silas Marner*.
