TBBL Web Catalog Updated

The redesigned WebOPAC has several new features available for you to explore. Start on the home page (http://www.state.lib.la.us/klasweb/index.jsf) for announcements or important messages. From here you can search for books using the *search* button, browse predefined lists such as recently added titles or log in to manage your account.

Search

Click on search and you will see a simple search screen. The easiest thing to do is to type what you are looking for in the query box and press enter. The system will look at all the available indexes and return a list of your search results.

Filters

Once you get a set of search results, you can use the filters along the left side to limit what you see. The filters are labeled and give you the opportunity to either limit the result to certain types of items, or to exclude those items. For example, the medium filter allows you to choose to include just digital books by clicking on the digital book link. You could also look at everything except digital books by clicking on the minus sign to the right of the digital books link. The filters allow you to narrow down your search until you get exactly what you want.

Other options from search results

On the search results screen, you have several options. You can:

- Click on the title to pull up the full description of the book. You can add the title to your book basket from that screen or start the download if the download link is available. The full title display also has links you can use for other searches.
 - » The author name lets you see a list of books by that author.
 - » The narrator link lets you explore other books narrated by the same person.
 - » The *subject* link allow you to find other books in the same genre.
- Click on the link to start downloading the book if the link is available.
- Place a checkmark in the box to the left of the title. Click on add selected to book basket to start the process of putting those titles on request with the library.

Book basket options

The book basket contains titles in which you have indicated an interest. From here you will be able to download an electronic request to add books to your request list or rush a book if a hard copy is available.

Alerts

The alerts give you information about the book that could affect whether or not you want to get it. For example, the alerts could tell you the book is in a language you don't have on your record or if you have already checked it out. It will also alert you if there is something in the book that might be objectionable according to your personal settings. Your options will be listed in the actions column.

Actions

You have several options for processing your book basket. You can:

- Remove the title
- Rush a title to expedite receiving a physical copy
- Download the title if the applicable link is available

Login

You can search and create a book basket without actually logging into the system. When you click on the download link for a BARD title, you will be taken to the login screen for BARD where you'll have to enter your credentials.

To otherwise process your book basket and submit requests for materials, you will need to log in. You can do so using the login button below the book basket or by using the login link at the top right of the page.

Clear basket

This button will remove the items from your book basket as well as your request for them.

Example searches

Browse

The *browse* button takes you to a set of predefined lists. The first few titles on the list are displayed, and you have the option of clicking the see more button to review the rest of them. Some of the browses that are in place include recently added titles and popular titles based on the number of circulations that they have had.

Your account

The your account link allows patrons who are logged in to see their account. Once you are logged in, you can view your current shipping address and reading profile, look at the most recent shipments sent to you and review/manage your request list. You can fill in a form to submit changes needed for your shipping and reading information. With your request list, you can view the titles, remove them from your list, download them (if applicable) or rush them.

Loan periods for magazines

As with books on digital cartridge, the magazines need to be returned to help keep costs down and potentially expand the magazine program. The cartridge loan period for weekly publications is one week after you receive them. The cartridge loan period for monthly, bimonthly and quarterly publications is one month after you receive them. In some cases you may receive a magazine cartridge that has more than one magazine on it. Any magazine cartridge that contains a combination of weekly, monthly, bimonthly or quarterly publications will have a loan period of one month after you receive it.

ABL 2013 state convention

Affiliated Blind of Louisiana (ABL) will celebrate 30 years of support service to blind, visually impaired and deafblind at its 2013 state convention. The convention will be held October 18-20 at the Hotel Acadiana, 1801 West Pinhook Road, Lafayette, LA.

ABL provides rehabilitation services through its Training Center. ABL was formed by a few blind and visually handicapped individuals who believed achieving one's dreams should not be hindered by a disability. Landmark Treaty for the Visually Impaired

The Landmark Treaty is another important achievement for equal rights, this time for more than 1 million Americans — and more than 340 million people worldwide — who are blind, visually impaired or who have other print disabilities.

In April 2012, President Barack Obama expressed the United States' commitment to the treaty, which "ensures that copyright is not a barrier to equal access to information, culture and education for visually impaired persons and persons with print disabilities." In Morocco, he joined more than 150 countries in approving the treaty, which holds the potential to open up a world of

knowledge to a population that is too often shut off from it.

The treaty will facilitate the development and distribution of accessible format print works within the framework of the international copyright system.
