NOBLE is a North Carolina service similar to BARD through which users can download locally produced or locally distributed digital Braille books, digital talking books and magazines. No application is necessary to download them.
Volumes will be added to BARD
quarterly as they become available.
All digital talking books available
from NOBLE are produced in a
format that can only be read on an
NLS approved player. Downloaded
audio files are zipped and need to
be unzipped onto a flash drive to

2015 Braille calendars are now available. If you are not currently on the list to receive the calendar, call your reader adviser to request one.

Digital check out limit

The new limit of 25 has been established as the maximum number of digital books a person may have checked out at any one time. Once this limit is reached, no new books will be sent until others are returned. Although our collection has continued to grow, and there are more digital books available, the cartridge medium is still expensive and there is a limit to what can be

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replaced. Keep in mind that others would like to read the books that you have enjoyed. To receive new books, return books within the 30-day loan period.

Reader's Handbook 2014

TBBL Reader's Handbook has been updated and is available now on the TBBL website. The handbook describes the services offered by TBBL and provides information for new patrons of the service. All new patrons will receive a copy. Others can obtain the handbook by calling a reader adviser.

iBill currency readers

The iBill currency readers will be widely available to all U.S. citizens or persons legally residing in the U.S. who are blind or visually impaired, starting January 2, 2015. Individuals who are not NLS patrons must submit an application, signed by a competent authority who can certify eligibility. Applications will be available on the Bureau of Printing and Engraving website for non-NLS patrons beginning January 2, 2015. TBBL patrons can contact their

reader adviser for information on how to sign up earlier.

If you would like to receive a packet with brochures, applications and general information about TBBL for your organization, please let us know. For example, over the past year we have sent packets to optometrists and nursing homes and have handed them out at health fairs.

Letters About Literature contest for kids and young adults!

Letters About Literature is a reading and writing contest for students in grades 4-12. Students are asked to read a book, poem or speech and then write to that author (living or dead) describing how the book affected them personally.

Letters are judged at state and national levels. Tens of thousands of students from throughout the country enter Letters About Literature each year. If you are in grades 4-12, you are eligible to enter. To find out more, please visit this website: http://read.gov/letters/.

Tech tips

BARD mobile device

When registering a new mobile device, please call your reader adviser to ask for removal of the mobile device that is no longer in use. This will prevent future rejections when registering new mobile devices.

Battery vs plugged in

The digital player is portable but it should remain plugged into an outlet much of the time. The player uses the battery power even when you are not listening to a book. If the player is unplugged for an extended period of time the battery level will become low and never fully recharge. If you are experiencing low battery levels of less than 10 hours you may need a new battery. Call the TBBL and ask to speak to Pete Gagliano if your battery keeps running low.

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Navigating the book

Both the advanced and standard players have a feature that will take you to either the beginning or the end of the book.

If you are using the standard player, press and hold the rewind button until you hear "beginning of book." Similarly, press and hold the fast forward button until you hear "end of book."

If you are using the advanced player, select the bookmark level by pressing the menu button until you hear "bookmark jump." Press and hold the previous button to move the reading position to the beginning of the book. Similarly, press and hold the next button to move to the end of the book.

We have received calls from some readers who reported hearing the "end of book" message when they first started to play a digital book or halfway through the book. If this happens, read the next section. A player reset may fix the problem. If this does not work, put a rubber band around the cartridge and check "defective" on the mail card when you return it. Call your reader adviser to request another copy.

Two ways to reset the digital player

A hardware reset can be used if the player stops responding to commands. With the power off, press and hold the power button more than seven seconds until a beep is heard. The player will reboot and should respond to commands.

Resetting the player to factory defaults may eliminate problems you are experiencing with your player. The reset will erase the saved current positions of the book's history, erase all bookmarks, restore the default values for volume, tone and speed, and erase the history of button presses. To reset the player to factory default settings, turn off the player. Press and hold the tone up, speed up and volume up buttons while pressing the power button. The player will announce "creating new profile." The player must then be powered off to save the new profile.

"Cartridge error" message

If you hear "cartridge error," try playing another cartridge in the player. If the other cartridge works, then return the defective cartridge to the library and call your reader adviser for a new copy. If several cartridges fail to play, the player should be returned for servicing. Call your reader adviser for a replacement player.
