As of January 2015 we will no longer loan cassettes — they are in the process of being phased out. If you do not already have a digital player, please call us at 800.543.4702 or write and we will send one to you. They are very easy to use, and each book fits on one cartridge instead of several tapes.

Accessible movies for everyone

Did you know that many movie theaters offer descriptive video headsets for visually impaired guests? Viewers wearing the headsets can hear a narration of the events, actions and scene changes throughout the movie. Some theaters also offer an assistive listening device for those with a hearing impairment. The device clarifies and intensifies the movie's audio. Call your local theater and ask if these options are available in your area.

Digital talking book cartridge cable

This cable allows you to copy a book from BARD onto your blank cartridge. Your cartridge plugs into one side of the cable, and there is a standard USB plug on the other end to plug into your computer. You must be a registered BARD user and purchase your own cartridge to borrow a cable. You can find a

Please check to see if you have one of the library copies of the Bible (DB 68777). We used to have fifty copies but most of them are missing or very overdue. If you would like an audio copy of the King James Version (KJV) Bible to keep, they are available through Aurora Ministries for a donation of \$15 at 941.748.3031 or http:// audiobiblesfortheblind.org/. Or your reader advisor can request a free KJV or New Living Translation Bible on cartridge from Braille Bible International or the Assemblies of God Church.

Windows Eyes for Office free download

Are you running a licensed version of Office 2010 or later on your computer? If so you may want to take advantage of the free Windows Eyes for Office screen reader download offered by GW Micro and Microsoft. You may download it at www.windoweyesforoffice.com. If you don't have an Internet connection and would like a physical copy, you may purchase one from GW Micro at 260.489.3671.

Free software

Kurzweil 3000 is an integrated scan and read software program that provides access to reading material with optical character recognition. With Kurzweil 3000 and its cloudbased partner, Firefly, you can upload text-based documents like Microsoft Word or PDF files and have the software read and or enlarge the text. Translation and dictionary features are also available and it works with the Firefox Internet browser.

This software is available for free if you live in East Baton Rouge or Pointe Coupee Parish. If you live in one of these parishes, contact your local library to get a license number to use this helpful software. If you are in another parish in Louisiana, call your local public library and ask about the JAWS workstation. The State Library placed one in every parish.

Books and Beyond A section for children and teens

ReadBooks! program

ReadBooks! is a national children's Braille literacy program that encourages families of children who are blind to read print/Braille books together.

National Braille Press, along with Seedlings Braille Books for Children, is distributing Braille book bags to families with children who are blind or visually impaired, up to age seven, throughout the U.S. and Canada. The distribution process is a collaborative effort with educators and early intervention professionals. The bags are limited to one Braille book bag per child who is blind.

Braille bags contain:

- an age-appropriate print/Braille book in English or Spanish for three age groups: birth to three, four to five, and six to seven
- a Braille primer for sighted parents entitled Just Enough to Know Better

- a tactile ball (red bags only)
- a print/Braille bookmark
- a print/Braille alphabet card
- Because Books Matter, a guide for parents about why and how to read books with their young blind child
- Because Pictures Matter, a guide for parents on the importance of tactile pictures for their blind child
- tactile maze or flag
- Wikki Stix, a product that allows a child to make tactile pictures (green or blue bags only)
- gift coupon redeemable for another print/Braille book or Braille/large print playing cards
- print/Braille magnetic letters or numbers (blue or green bags only)
- Braille Caravan block
- description of the program on DVD.
